



improvements monies (also from the state) is money that the state holds and towns can use for one time, nonrecurring, capital expenditures. In the town of Sterling, we are typically annually allotted about \$40.000.00. This money can be left, to accumulate, for larger projects. We, in Sterling, have used this money, in the past, to build our existing town garage, dog pound, sand and salt shed and to build bridges. This summer, Sterling has another bridge mandated for replacement by the state bridge inspection team. We will use our local capital improvement monies to fund this necessary construction project.

The mill rate in each town is calculated using a formula that includes both state revenues and monies raised by taxes. Last year, for example, Sterling received from the state \$185,849.00 for the budget of the Selectmen and On Feb. 9th Murray Newton is putting on a Valentine Program at 7:30 on Thursday in Higganum and Martha Trask is putting on the CWA program.

\$3,406,460.00 for the education portion.

We had to raise, through taxes, \$1,426,829.00 for the Selectmen's budget and \$7,653,643.00 for education. Our mill rate was set last year at 21.11; without state aid, it would have been 39.85! In Sterling, the budget of the Selectmen includes the school buses. Our school also applies for grant monies to the state board of education and in the last fiscal year, Sterling received \$877,812.00 in grant dollars.

Towns would certainly have a difficult time without assistance from the state; still, all monies do come, ultimately, from each of us.

I hope that every voter makes a special effort to attend the budget meetings in his/her town; and then, please, go vote on the budget. It is important to know how your dollars are being spent!

It's been running very efficiently, already saving the Grange over \$100 per month in oil. We thank from the bottom of our hearts all of the members and the Winchester Center Volunteer Fire Department for the generous donations towards this very costly project. Unlike mostGrange Halls, Winchester's is required boiler to heat an extremely large structure that houses the Grange, the former Fire Department (now storage and extra meeting space) and the Post Office. Robert Kitch has only been in uniform for a few months, but he's already acting like a hero.

The UConn freshman, who enrolled in the ARMY ROTC program, stepped up on Tuesday night. When a three-car chain-reaction crash quickly turned into a car fire, he and another good samaritan pulled an unconscious man to safety.

"The wheel ended up catching fire and the man was passed out from smoke inhalation in the driver seat, so I went onto the other side and started bashing it with my elbow," Kitch said.

But the glass was too thick. Another good samaritan saw Rob struggling and stepped in to help. "He actually had a hammer in his car and he broke the window. That's how we got it started," Kitch said. Even when the two men got into the car, it was still a struggle. There was so much smoke,

A few minutes later, the fire department put out the flames and paramedics got to the scene.



The Power of Visuals

"As far as the eye can see." "I get the

picture." "A picture is worth a thousand words." "My view on the subject is..."

Visual communication is a part of our everyday lives. The story could even be conveying the benefits of being a Grange member to prospective members. Photos and graphics not only inform and engage the public, but they also entertain. > Armed with this information, how can my Grange take advantage of visual communications?

Take photos. Lots of photos. Bring a digital camera to every Grange meeting and event, then share the photos with your members. Hang the photos on a bulletin board in your hall. Make a Grange Scrapbook and bring it to your meetings to share with your members and visitors. Post the photos on your Grange's Facebook Page and website, and send them to the CT State Grange website to be added into the Virtual Scrapbook. Send the photos to the CT Granger for publication. E-mail the best of the photos and a well-written caption to your local newspapers. Create a poster using the photos to promote upcoming Grange events. Integrate the photos into a presentation. Print out the photos for a Grange display that can be used in the local library, at a local Agricultural Fair, or even at a trade show or Chamber of Commerce meeting. Enter the photos in the Lecturer's Photo Contest or exhibit them at your local Ag Fair. Tell your Grange story with visuals, capture and retain the public's attention, and reap the benefits.

There was a time when she made so many complicated necklaces and earrings you'd think she was in the jewelry business and everyone marveled at it all.


Hannah served as Chaplain on Edith's Installation Team and kept the ladies outfitted with beads to match the gowns they sewed under the direction of Hannah and Edie.


Other memberships included the Orange Alliance Church and the Bradford Masonic Temple.


