

Fime for resolutions



This is the time of year to start composing resolutions that you would like your Grange to submit to your Pomona Granges then pass on to State Grange. The assist you, the Legislative Committee are presenting resolution writing workshops around the state. We also have

created a template that can be used as a guideline for writing your resolutions. Check the State Grange Website for information. (www.ctstategrange.org)

The Connecticut General Assembly session is in its final days and there have been a few controversial bills proposed this year. One of the biggest was the repeal of the death penalty. I expect we will still be hearing more on this in the coming months. Changes to the rules for educators, especially the tenure program for teachers, were Governor Malloy's primary focus this year. This session also brought out a few other interesting topics that did not necessarily make it out of committees but are issues to think about. The banning of wood furnaces was again proposed. This bill was less restrictive than last year's bill. This one recommended banning their use from May until October. The State Grange policy is in opposition of banning their use. These furnaces can be used for heating hot water as well as heating homes, farms and nurseries. One question that was asked during the committee hearing was how many farmers were using outdoor wood burning furnaces for heating hot water for their farming business. 

Work on the latest phase of mechanical work at our hall has finally been completed. our kitchen is below As grade, the sinks require a pump to drain water to the septic. The previous system had a manually controlled pump that had to be switched on and off each time the sinks were used. Of course, this type of system is not acceptable to the Torr. Area Health, so we had a new automatic pump and tank installed to prevent back-flow into the sinks. Unfortunately, the first tank leaked and a new tank was ordered. The second tank also leaked requiring a third. Finally the third is working fine and the new system is up and running with a new designated handwashing sink and a new faucet for the existing sinks. We are now looking for a commercial grade refrigerator to replace one or both of the non-commerical models we currently have. Hopefully the Health Department will be satisfied with the improvements.



would be interested in hearing from you.

Another bill proposed was changes to liability for recreational use of land that is owned by municipalities. This would include political subdivisions of the state which I believe includes the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) along with water and sewer districts. If the land is unimproved, presently there is no liability, but if improvements are made, are they liable? The proposed bill would add boardwalks, public beaches, structures for spectator seating and paved walking trails to these exemptions. Boardwalks can apply to any wooden or wood like walkway. Public beaches can be found along the sound, lakes or rivers. Paved sidewalks could be bikeways and trails. This brings into question what if a municipality adds a boardwalk, beach, or a paved hiking/biking trail to a public area and then does not maintained it. Do they have an obligation to maintain their property improvements? If someone is injured because of lack of maintance, should the municipality be responsible? Would not having this exemption discourage municipalities from making improvements or open their land for recreational use? I am in no way suggesting one way or the other, just food for thought.

This year we saw a bill proposed requiring the labeling of genetically altered foods. This bill would require that any foods that have genetically engineered foods in them be labeled as such. Would food prices be affected if we require foods sold in Connecticut to be labeled as genetically altered foods while labeling was not required in nearby states? Would this impact some companies enough so they would stop marketing some products in Connecticut? Would it be better to suggest labeling if they do not have genetically engineered ingredients? Do we even care if they are labeled? Does this have to be addressed on a National basis? I know that this subject caught the attention of our State Master.

Consider events affecting your community or topics like supporting the fight against childhood obesity. Should we consider supporting the growth of the Farm to School Lunch program? Maybe we can work on increasing awareness on the benefits of healthy eating for our children. These are some ideas of what could be brought up for resolutions. Look around your community and become involved.



Centralizing Communications

Terri Fassio, P.R. Co-Director

Does your Grange have all of its communication ducks in a row, or are communications structured like a house of cards that can fall at any moment? This is a delicate subject, as most do not find issue with their practices until a situation arises and it is too late, and the damage is done.

If Granges want to present a unified, professional presence to the public, the best way to begin is to centralize their communications. This means, that all means of communication are from a Grange perspective, and not from an individual member perspective. There are three main areas -- mailing address, phone number and e-mail.

It is never the best practice to use a Grange member's home address, e-mail address and phone number for official Grange communications. What if something was to happen to said member? How would other members receive phone calls, e-mails, and the USPS mail, such as bills and important letters?

This very thing happened to another organization that I belong to outside of the Grange. The President of the group died unexpected (after being President of the group for nearly 20 years), and his family had no care or concern whatsoever about his philanthropical interests. So when his family cleaned out his home, they literally threw out everything having to do with the organization, despite the continued pleas of members from the group. It was a nightmare for this group to have to rebuild from the ground-floor up, losing decades worth of historical information, and also not being able to access bank accounts, write checks and pay bills, access safety deposit boxes and more. It has now been over 4 years since that President passed, and the group is still struggling to put the pieces back together. Do not let this happen to your Grange.

This leaves the question, "how does my Grange take the steps to centralize communications without breaking the bank?"

Following are just a few examples of

call forwarding." The service also has voice mail, and users can listen to and manage voice messages online, such as filing and archiving them. Voice mails and Text Messages can also be received as e-mails. Users can customize multiple greetings by caller and by group. Users can also dial out from any of their associated phones using a Web interface, and the call recipient sees the Google Voice phone number on their Caller-ID. For more information or to sign-up, visit http://www.google.com/voice

Mail: The US Post Office

As with phone numbers, Granges should have a centralized address for official Grange mail. If the Grange has a Hall, does the Hall have a mail receptacle? If not, a P.O. Box is the next best thing. Post Office Boxes keep members home addresses private and confidential, are efficient to separate personal mail from Grange mail avoiding mail loss, and are accessible and secure as the Grange can control who accesses the box. The cost for a P.O. Box varies by size and location, but 6-month fees start as low as \$14. You can even reserve your P.O. Box online by visiting https://www.usps.com/manage/geta-po-box.htm

E-mail:

Grange-specific E-mail Addresses

State Grange A11 CTOfficers, Committees, and Community Granges have been assigned a FREE e-mail address and mailbox (ie: yourgrange@ctstategrange.org). Instructions on how to access these accounts were given to all Granges in their Public Relations Packs. Currently, nearly 100% of Officers and Committees are accessing their Grange e-mail, and approximately 1/2 of the Granges in the state are using these e-mail address periodically, if not regularly. Using a Grange-specific e-mail address supports branding of the Grange in Connecticut while providing a professional "face" to the public, the media, and also to the State Officials and Representatives. When a Grange member sends out a "Grange" e-mail, it will be taken more seriously coming from yourgrange@CTStateGrange.org than it does from hotlips@yahoo.com (I know the yahoo e-mail is an extreme example, but we actually do have some folks who have similar style e-mail addresses and use it for official Grange business.) If you are not already using your Grange e-mail, please contact information@ctstategrange.org and we will send you access instructions. The more Granges that use their e-mail addresses. the more efficient we can communicate as a group. Plus, every e-mail sent and received saves printing and mailing a letter - thus saving at least 45ϕ in postage alone. One of the biggest advancements available to Granges is communications technology. Specifically, tools and resources available at low or no cost, to enable Granges to centralize communications, and thus better promote themselves as a unified group, and get their name out onto the tips of everyone's tongues.



Inspection season is well upon us and we sincerely thank all of the secretaries, treasurers and lecturers who work so hard to make sure their Granges are ready on the night of inspection. It brings us the greatest joy to find everything in perfect order and very little in the line of suggestions needed when we visit a particular Grange.

For those Granges who are awaiting the arrival of your Deputy, please remember to review the inspection report found in the center of the current Blue Book and fill in as much of the "Additional Information" material requested and make sure all of the Grange's records are available for the Deputy on the night of inspection. While we encourage Granges to keep records electronically, we require either a print-out of these records on the night of inspection or the ability to review the records on a laptop. It is not acceptable to say that they cannot be brought in because they are on a desktop model computer. The inability to bring in the records for inspection also indicates the same records are not readily available to your members.

There have been a few changes to the Deputy team in recent months that need to be explained. When Farmington Valley Pomona disbanded, Cherry Brook and Cawasa Granges joined Mountain County Pomona. Purpose: To assemble a team of Youth from across the nation to exemplify the 1873 Grange degrees in period dress.

- · Youth with speaking parts will be responsible to memorize their parts.

Kingsley Beecher

There aren't many people in our fraternity who don't know the name Beecher, or know of the contributions made to the Order by members of the family. Kingsley Beecher is a prime example.

The Grange played an important part in the lives of Kingsley and his wife, Betty. He was active in every possible way in Winchester Grange and Mountain County Pomona being an outstanding Master of both Granges. The highest office he achieved in the Grange was that of Assistant Steward of the National Grange.

He grew up with not only a love of Grange, but with that of country fairs. When he became State Master, he presented numerous ideas for consideration of the Patrons. The National Grange celebrated a milestone anniversary (100 years) so he appointed a group of people to head the Connecticut celebration. Our state event met with so much success, he decided he didn't want to let the group go and called them to a special meeting with the idea of establishing a state fair. He appointed them as the charter board of directors of what was to become the Connecticut Agricultural Fair.

He was instrumental in starting the State Grange Credit Union which along with the fair became an

Shipping cost are at a greatly reduced rate and all shipments will be made directly to the Grange, or designated fundraising chairperson, for distribution of product. worked with Yankee Candle to choose three sizes of candles in several different available scents that reflect our image and values and have high selling potential. These available scents and sizes range from small votive candles to large jar candles and include popular Farmhouse Apple, Home Sweet Home and Kitchen Spice. Should these scents become unavailable, the

National Grange will update all potential sellers at the time they request order forms or for those Granges currently selling items, an email will be sent to the Subordinate, Pomona or State Grange's fundraiser chairperson to inform them of the change.

Any Grange can become involved. There is no limit to the number of candles a Grange may sell and no limit to the amount of times a Grange may run this fundraiser. There is no limit to the timeframe in which the fundraiser may be completed, however, Yankee Candle and the Grange recommend a short sale period. The National Grange recommends no more than a month from the date of beginning to the end date of the fundraiser. This ensures that people who order items from a Grange receive their candles in a reasonable amount of time.

In order to take part in this fundraiser, your Grange must appoint a chairperson who can request

The National Grange will send a fundraising kit to the chairperson who must review the documents, provide order forms to local sellers and review with them the guidelines for the sale. Upon completion of the fundraiser, local fundraising chairs are responsible for collecting all the order forms and money from sellers, calculating shipping cost for the order and remitting the correct payment amount to the National Grange, then depositing the profit from the fundraiser in the appropriate Subordinate, Pomona or State Grange account.

Fundraising chairs are required to remit with payment of candles a copy of the Chairperson's Form and a copy of each seller's form. The National Grange will place the order with Yankee Candle and provide to the fundraising chair confirmation. The candles will arrive in 2 to 3 weeks from the date of order.

WHY THIS IS A GREAT FUNDRAISER

Not only are candles amazing sales products, they are small packages of goodwill. As we all know, one of our most powerful senses is that of smell. When people smell a good scent, they are likely to be happier and more at ease. Having a great-smelling candle in your home with the Grange logo is more likely to make you associate the Grange with positive feelings and memories.

SOME ADDED TIPS

While the scents chosen for sale as part of this fundraiser are all popular and proven to sell, it is important to understand that often candles, and other scented products, sell themselves when people sniff them.

If you are considering the Grange Yankee Candle fundraiser for your Grange, especially $\mathbf{i}\mathbf{f}$ you are considering selling these at a table, stand or event, it is highly suggested that you order from the National Grange at least one candle of each scent as part of the "Candle Sampler Kit" available through Samantha Johnson, Director of the Programs, Benefits and Sales Department.

These candles may be sold by the Grange after the initial fundraiser is complete, recouping the cost of the kit and allowing the Grange to make a \$25 profit from the kit alone.
